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# Florida Health Care Expenditures in 2014

## Introduction

The Florida Agency for Health Care Administration (Agency) has published the Florida Health Care (Expenditures Report) annually since 1992. This statistical brief updates the Expenditures Report, displaying trends in Florida health care expenditures during calendar year 2014. Health care expenditures equal a combination of revenues and wages from health care providers, such as facilities and practitioners, who provide services and medical supplies to individual patients. Wage data is obtained from the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO). The revenue from these providers is obtained by various sources including consumers, insurers, and government agencies. This statistical brief specifically provides expenditure information relating to health care services, health care payers, and health maintenance organizations (HMOs).

## Data and Methodology

DEO wage data for Florida is grouped according to the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS)<sup>i</sup>. NAICS is a national standard used to group business organizations in specific categories for collecting, analyzing, and publishing statistical data<sup>ii</sup>. Prior to 2002, the Expenditures Report used the U.S. Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) Manual<sup>iii</sup> as the standard grouping method for the expenditures. To maintain consistency with the reports over the years, the expenditures grouped by NAICS were matched up to the SIC groupings, creating the categories used in the reports between 2002 and 2014. The mapping was done by using the SIC – 2012 NAICS Crosswalk (see Appendix A). This report has updated the NAICS groupings to reflect the current National Health Expenditures (NHE) categories with the new crosswalk provided in Appendix B, provided by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), and the most recent census year data<sup>iv</sup>. The dashboard for this year's report showcases the prior year's methodologies and groupings to show the trends from 1992 to 2014 as well as the new methodology and groupings. The new methodology as applied in this written report will be used going forward, showing the data from 2011 onward. There is not an exact match from the NAICS and SIC categories, creating some discrepancy in the data from prior years' reports when comparing the individual expenditure categories between Florida and the U.S.

Wages constitute 36 percent of total healthcare expenditures. DEO wage data and the most recent wage and expenditure data provided by the U.S. Census bureau were used to calculate Florida expenditures for most of the health care service categories. To identify health expenditures other than wages, which DEO does not provide, a ratio was developed using the DEO wage data and the most recent U.S. census year wage and population data (2007). This ratio was then applied to the National Health Expenditures to create Florida specific estimates. These categories included Medicinal Drugs and Durable Medical Equipment<sup>v,vi</sup>. The NHE data is updated and revised every year for the current and previous periods, resulting in expenditures displayed in this statistical brief being different from figures in previous years' reports. The Expenditures Report includes services provided for both residents and non-residents in the state of Florida.

The principal health care payer categories include Medicaid, Medicare, Other Public Funds, Private Insurance, Out-of-Pocket, and Other Private Sources. The Division of Medicaid Finance & Analytics at the agency provided the Medicaid payer expenditures. The 2014 Florida Medicare payer expenditures were estimated using the 2004 national and Florida Medicare expenditure ratio, along with the 2014 Medicare payer expenditures. The Medicaid and estimated Medicare expenditures, the estimated Florida health care service expenditures as described above, and the NHE obtained from CMS, were all used to create a ratio to estimate the other health care payer categories' 2014 expenditures. The new methodology and categories used for the health care services were used for the ratio to estimate the health care payer categories. Enrollment information for Medicare was obtained from the one-year Census estimate<sup>vii</sup>. For Medicaid, the annual enrollment information was collected from the Office of Economic & Demographic Research Social Services estimating conference<sup>viii</sup>. Both of these enrollment figures were used to determine expenditure per enrollee information.


The Florida Office of Insurance Regulation (FLOIR), Department of Financial Services, provided expenditure data on HMOs. These HMO plans include Commercial, Medicare, and Medicaid lines of businesses. Individual HMO financial data was used to calculate the expenditures for HMO plans as well as the cost of premiums per enrollee, total premiums, and enrollment data.

## Findings

### Overall Trend

In 2014, total health care expenditures in Florida reached \$161.7 billion, up from \$152.3 billion in 2013. In 2014, Florida had a larger annual percent increase in expenditures compared to the U.S. total health service expenditures estimated percent increase of 6.19 percent. This was the first year Florida service expenditures increased at a higher rate than the U.S. expenditures. Health Care services spending per capita in the state of Florida reached \$8,128 in 2014, or 18.95 percent of personal income compared to 17.32 percent of personal income in the U.S.<sup>ix</sup>.

### Expenditures by Health Service

Health care service expenditures categories include Hospital Care, Physician & Clinical Services, Other Professional Services, Dental Services, Other Health, Residential, and Personal Care, Home Health Care Services, Nursing Care Facilities, Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical Products, and Durable


Medical Equipment (see Appendix C). Data for the health care service graphs are displayed at the end of the findings in Tables 1, 2, and 3.

Expenditures by Health Service, Percent of Total Expenditure.

- Figure 2 displays the proportion of total expenditures among the various health services provided in Florida in 2014. Hospital Care, Physician and Clinical Services, and Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical products accounted for 79 percent, or \$128 billion, of Florida’s total health care service expenditures.
- From 2013-2014, service categories Hospital Care, Nursing & Continuing Care Facilities, and Home Health Care Facilities all slightly decreased their proportion of total service expenditures. All other categories slightly increased their proportions of expenditures with Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical products having the greatest proportional increase in Florida in 2014.
- The U.S. categories which showed slight decreases in their proportions of service expenditures from 2013-2014 include Hospital Care, Physician and Clinical Services, Nursing & Continuing Care Facilities, Dental Services, and Home Health Care Services. Similar to Florida, Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical products had the greatest proportional increase for the National Health expenditures.

**FIGURE 2: HEALTH SERVICE EXPENDITURES, PERCENT CHANGE FROM PREVIOUS YEAR.**




[Expenditures by Health Service in 2014, percent of total expenditure in 2014 comparing Florida and in U.S.](#)

- Figure 3 displays the comparison between the proportions of expenditures of the health services in Florida and the U.S. The top three health service categories with the largest expenditure proportions to the total were the same in Florida as the U.S., (Hospital Care, Physician & Clinical Services, and Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical products).
- From 2013-2014, the Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical products category showed the greatest proportional increase in both the U.S. and Florida. Both Florida and the U.S. showed a proportional increase of .7 percent for the Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical products category and remains as the third largest proportion of all the service expenditures.
- For both Florida and the U.S. service expenditures, the Hospital Service category remains the largest service expenditure category. Florida's hospital care service expenditures show a smaller proportion of total service expenditures at only 33.9 percent of the total compared to 37.9 percent of the total service expenditures for the U.S.
- For the second largest category, Physician & Clinical services, the proportional difference between Florida and the U.S. was 6.1 percent with Florida showing 29.6 percent of the total and the U.S. having 23.5 percent of the total service expenditures. Florida also had a larger proportion of Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical products at 15.5 percent of the total service expenditures compared to the U.S. Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical products proportion to the total.



- Figure 4 displays the individual Health Service categories expenditures totals and their percent change from the beginning of use of the new methodology in 2011. The length of the bars is the amount of expenditures for that service in billions.

- The Other Health, Residential, and Personal Care service category showed the largest percent change increase from 2011 at 27.52 percent and has the smallest proportion of the total expenditures. Nursing & Continuing Care Facilities had the smallest percent change from 2011 at 3.11 percent. Hospital Care Services is the largest proportion to the total service expenditures, but had the second smallest percent change from 2011 to 2014.




**FIGURE 5: EXPENDITURES BY HEALTH SERVICE PERCENT CHANGE, 2013-2014.**

- Figure 5 displays the service category percentage changes in expenditures from 2013 to 2014 for Florida.
- In both Florida and the U.S., Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical Products had the largest percentage increase of over 10 percent from 2013 to 2014.

- The Durable Medical Equipment category percentage change from 2013-2014 displayed the biggest difference between Florida and the U.S. than with any other service category with Florida having over a 9 percent change and the U.S. having over a 3 percent change.
- The top cost driver for expenditures, Hospital Care Services, had one of the smallest annual percent increases in Florida in 2013 at only 4.24 percent.

- Figure 6 displays the annual percent changes from 2011 through 2014 for the top three service expenditure cost drivers in Florida. Of the top three cost drivers, Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical products showed the largest percent change in 2013-2014. This is the largest annual percent change of any year or category from 2011-2014 at 11.12 percent.
- Prescription Drugs & Non-durable Medical Products is the only category of the top three cost drivers that has increased in the annual percent change each year.
- Both Hospital Care and Physician & Clinical Services had their highest percent change in 2013-2014, and their lowest percent change in 2012-2013.

### Expenditures by Payer

Health care payer expenditures are separated into six principal categories, Medicare; Medicaid; Other Private Sources; Other Public Funds; Out-of-Pocket; and Private Insurance (see Appendix D). Detailed data for health care payer graphs are displayed at the end of the findings in Tables 4 and 5.

#### Florida Expenditures by Health Care Payer, 2011-2014.


- Figure 7 displays private insurance and Medicare were the two largest payer expenditure categories in Florida. From Medicaid remained steady as the third largest over the 4-year period, with Out-of-Pocket payers being a close fourth.
- The two smallest payer categories, Other Public Funds and Other Private Sources, have remained the smallest payer expenditure categories from 2011-2014. Even though Other Private Sources has remained one of the smaller payer categories, the 2014 expenditures increased by the largest percent of any other category at 12.09 percent in Florida and 8.9

percent in the U.S. Out-of-Pocket expenses had the lowest expenditure percent of increase in Florida compared to any other category at 4.29 percent.

- The two smallest payer categories, Other Public Funds and Other Private Sources, have remained the smallest payer expenditure categories from 2011-2014.

**FIGURE 7: FLORIDA EXPENDITURES BY HEALTH CARE PAYER, 2011-2014**




Expenditures by Payer in Florida and the U.S., Percent of total expenditures.

- Figure 8 displays the proportion of health care payer categories expenditures to the total, displaying both Florida and U.S. For both Florida and the U.S., Private insurance remains the largest payer expenditure category.
- The Medicare payer category displayed the largest percentage difference between Florida and the U.S., representing a larger proportion of Florida's payer expenditures by over 7 percent. In 2014, Florida's over 65 population was over 4 percent greater than the national average, likely contributing to larger Medicare expenditures. Offsetting the larger Medicare proportion, the Florida Medicaid payer category represented a smaller portion of health care payers than the national Medicaid payer proportions by 4 percent.
- Medicare, Medicaid, and Other Public Funds expenditures decreased their proportions of total payer expenditures in 2014 compared to 2013 in Florida. In the U.S., only payer categories, Medicare, Medicaid, and Other Private Sources, showed a proportional increase from 2013-2014.




Expenditures by Payer in Florida, comparing 2011 and 2014.

- Figure 9 displays the individual health payer categories expenditures totals and their percent change from the beginning of the use of the new methodology in 2011.
- Other private sources and Medicaid were the payer categories, which displayed the largest increase in percent change in Florida in 2014 compared to 2011. Other Private Sources had a 32 percent increase from 2011-2014, yet represents the smallest proportion of total expenditures. Out-of-Pocket payer expenditures had the smallest percent change increase of 6 percent, comparing 2011 to 2014.

**FIGURE 9: EXPENDITURES BY PAYER IN FLORIDA, COMPARING 2011 AND 2014.**




Medicaid and Medicare Expenditures per Recipient and Annual Percentage change in Expenditures, 2012-2014.

- Figure 10 shows Medicaid payers showed a 5.2 percent increase in expenditures in 2014, coinciding with a 0.76 percent decrease in spending per recipient. Medicare showed an increase in expenditures as well as in spending per recipient.

- Medicare expenditures per enrollee increased after two consecutive years decreasing, with the 2014 expenditures/enrollee increase change being 1.7 percent. In 2014 the caseload for Medicare increased by 3.7 percent, which is a larger increase than in 2013, but still lower than 2011 and 2012. Medicare enrollment included the total of both original Medicare and Medicare Advantage plans.

## Florida HMO Expenditures


HMO expenditures encompass Medicaid, Medicare, and commercial lines of businesses. The HMO plans in Florida are regulated by the FLOIR, and the financial statements were obtained from the annual financial statements collected by the Florida Department of Financial Services (see Appendices E, F, and G). Data coinciding with many of these HMO graphs are displayed at the end of the findings in Tables 6, 7, and 8.

### Total HMO Expenditures in Florida and Percent change in Expenditures, 2014.


FIGURE 11: TOTAL HMO EXPENDITURES IN FLORIDA AND PERCENT CHANGE IN EXPENDITURES, 2014.

- Figure 11 shows in 2014, Florida HMO expenditures increased from 2013 by 35.93 percent, to a total of \$26.21 billion. This is the third year in a row in which HMO expenditures have displayed an increased growth rate. This is also the largest growth rate reported since 2011.

Proportion of Total Premiums by HMO Line of Businesses, 2013-2014.

- In 2014, the largest proportion of the HMO revenue source came from Medicare at 46.38 percent, coinciding with Commercial (Accident/Health) being the second largest payer category. This is a decrease in percent of total for Medicare premiums from 2013. Medicare premiums equaled over \$13 of the over \$28 billion in total premiums. Medicare had the largest premiums percent change decrease.
- Figure 12, indicates a decrease in proportion to the total enrollment for Medicare, but an increase in proportion for Medicaid and Commercial in 2014. Overall, the HMO premium revenue increased by 29.35 percent in 2014, coinciding with a 29.14 percent HMO enrollment annual change.

**FIGURE 12: PROPORTION OF TOTAL PREMIUMS BY HMO LINES OF BUSINESSES, 2013-2014.**




Total Enrollment and Premiums/Enrollment Percent change, 2011-2014.

- Figure 13 shows the HMO annual enrollment and premiums per enrollee percent change for Commercial, Medicaid and Medicare line of businesses trends from 2011 through 2014. The premium per enrollee percent change highlights whether the premium amounts increased or decreased.
- In 2014, HMO commercial plans reported an annual increase in the premium change percentage for two years in a row, from almost 4 percent in 2012 to 2 percent in 2013 and then to nearly 14 percent in 2014. This is the largest increase since 2011. Commercial plans represent the largest proportions of the total enrollment at 40 percent and a 32 percent increase in enrollment from 2013-2014. This also coincides with an increase by 14 percent in 2013-14 in premiums per enrollee.
- Medicaid HMO enrollment has continued to rise for the third year in a row reaching 1.84 million in 2014. Similar to the commercial plans, the premiums per enrollee for Medicaid HMO's have also shown an increase in 2014 at 34.43 percent. This is the highest premium per enrollee percentage increase of all the HMO lines of businesses.
- Medicare is the only line of business that showed a decrease in premiums per enrollee percentage at -4 percent, with enrollment increasing. This is the second year in a row showing a percent decrease in premiums per enrollee for Medicare lines of businesses.
